"Derusha" — A Name of Divine Pursuit

In Hebrew, Derusha (דְרוֹשָה) is derived from the root word "darash" (דָרוֹשָה), which means "to

seek," "to inquire," "to search out with care." It is not a passive curiosity, but an active,

deliberate pursuit—a reaching through the wilderness for something of eternal worth.

This word comes to life in **Isaiah 62:12**:

"And they shall call them The Holy People, The Redeemed of the LORD; and you shall be called

Sought Out, A City Not Forsaken."

"Sought Out" — Derusha — is a declaration stamped on the hearts of those who have been

pursued by God's relentless love. It's the name spoken over the abandoned, the broken, the

overlooked. It's the banner over the weary soul, reminding them they are not invisible to heaven.

To be *Derusha* is to be seen in your suffering, found in your forsakenness, and called holy by the

One who redeems all things. It's not just a name—it's a divine identity. It means the ministry of

that no one would remain lost, and all would know they have been sought out by grace.
